





Things to do

When you hear water running over rocks, detect an eagle's peal, and see a flash of red fur on the riverbank; you know you're in Bentonsport. Wildlife is just as much at home here as you will be.

Paddle your canoe/kayak in the Lower Des Moines River and watch herons, kingfishers and rac-

coons fish along the banks. Under bridges witness the aerial feats of swifts. Near a snag, you may startle wood ducks and their brood. If the river is too swift or low, Lacey Lake and Lake Sugema are close by.

Pick up a copy of the Bentonsport Self-Guided Tour and stroll through the village as you read about the historical homes, commercial buildings, churches, and schools still used.

Inside rock foundations of a mill pond and its mill is the **Rose and Shade Gardens**, created and maintained by volunteers for nearly 45 years.

A place not to miss is **Tony Sanders' Indian Artifact Museum.** He has collected more than 5,000 arrowheads and artifacts, as well as prehistoric mammoth bones. Even more fascinating are the hand-tooled mosaic cases and mountings Sanders has made from native woods.

Bentonsport Timber trailhead and parking are just northeast of the Presbyterian Church at the hill crest. This trail winds through 60 acres of prairie and woodland and alongside **a fishing pond**.

A few **Villages Folk School** instructors of artisan skills teach in Bentonsport. If you are interested, re-

serve your place in these enjoyable classes on the Internet at *villages folkschool.com*.

For birders, Bentonsport is a few miles from Lake Sugema-Lacey Keosauqua Bird Conservation Area where 250 bird species live, migrate or visit.





On the north side of Hawk Drive, **Iron and Lace, Sweet Maple Mercantile, Greef General Store with Addie May Fudge, and Treen Woodworks** offer delightful pottery; ironwork; fiber-wood-glass artworks, antiques, fudge in several flavors, and handcrafted wood and iron gifts for that special memento from your trip. Down the street to the southwest is **Sisters Vintage & More**, on the first floor of the Odd Fellows Building. Antiques, vintage items, collectibles, and rare finds are here.







The **Des Moines** River is home to channel catfish, flathead catfish, goldeye, northern pike, paddlefish, saugeye, shortnose gar, shovelnose sturgeon, smallmouth bass, walleye and white bass. **Lake Sugema** is stocked with largemouth bass, walleye, bluegill, black crappie, channel catfish, and saugeye.

Facilities

Bentonsport Riverside County Park, Campground and Shelter House

Maintained by Van Buren County Conservation, this park runs along the river from the shady camp-ground to the Odd Fellows Bldg.

The camp-ground has 23 modern sites with gravel camp pads, fire rings, picnic tables, 30 and 50 amp electricity, and pit toilet. Adjacent to the campground



is a playground and shelter house with restrooms and showers open 24/7 during warm weather. Walk ins welcome on non reserved sites. To reserve a site go to *my-countyparks.com*. To reserve the shelter house, contact the office at 319-293-3589

Historic Presbyterian Church

Constructed in 1855, this church has been maintained just as it was. The building is open to the public May 1 thru Oct. 31. Non denominational services are held Sundays at 9 am June thru September.
